**THE HONORABLE HYMAN RUBIN
THE HONORABLE WALTER J BRISTOW**

**FOR TAKING THE INITIATIVE TO
AGGRESSIVELY DEFEND
THE PRESERVATION OF CONGAREE SWAMP
DURING THE SENATE DEBATE OF APRIL 1976**

during the Oct, 3rd Annual Meeting:

“Try as we might to adopt written criteria for any honorary award, that award is always best defined by the nature of its recipients. I therefore can’t think of any better way to define this new “Order of the Cypress” than by looking to the example and character of these men whom we are honoring today.

In years to come, there are many others to whom we will want to award the Order of the Cypress because this majestic forest was saved only through the combined efforts of hundreds of people - one of whom, Harry Hampton, will be honored with the naming of the new visitor center now under construction.

If we were to spotlight a turning point in the 4 years of intense campaigning to save the swamp, we might

focus upon the spring of 1976. The successful “Congaree Action Nov/” Rally in the fall of 1975 set the stage for the campaign to flex its grassroots strength in the political arena. Bills to establish a Congaree Swamp National Monument were soon introduced in Congress.

Knowing that state political sentiment would affect the upcoming Congressional hearings on Congaree, Senator Marion

Gressette, the Senate’s senior member, introduced in February, 1976, a resolution (IS.744) which opposed the use of condemnation proceedings as a vehicle to obtain federal or state acquisition of Congaree. As sentiments in the State House approached the boiling point, legislators were entertained at the old hunting lodge in the heart of the Swamp.

That evening, Senator

Rubin walked outside for some fresh air and made a momentous decision. Jim Elder remembers the Senator calling later that night. Rubin said he remembered the presentation Elder had made to the delegation about 1 and 1/2 years earlier and he explained how seeing the giant trees in the full moonlight that night had affected him. Rubin said to Jim, “It is a moral

Annual Membership Meeting Held At Congaree Swamp National Monument

The Friends of Congaree Swamp held their annual meeting on Sunday, October 3rd, at the picnic area of the ranger station at the National Monument. A beautiful October afternoon was enjoyed by over a hundred members and family. Nature walks were led by John Cely, Fran Rametta, David Rembert, and Chick Gaddy. Lewis Prettyman took the first twelve to sign up on a canoe trip and Martha Bogle, Park Superintendent, took several groups on a tour of the construction site of the new Education and Visitors Center.

The Friends then gathered at 6:00 P.M. in the picnic area for the Annual Meeting; Brusi Alexander, President, presided. New board members were elected and other business was conducted. One highlight of the meeting was the awarding of the Order of the Cypress to former State Senators, the Honorable Hyman Rubin and the Honorable Walter Bristow. Both men and their families were present for the ceremony honoring these men who played such a vital role in establishing Congaree National Monument. Another highlight was the introduction of S. C. Air National Guard members, Carland Allen, Project Supervisor, and Randy Hudson, Chief of Procurement, by Superintendent Bogle. All are very proud of the unique co-venture of the National Guard and the Park Service in the building of the new Visitors' Center and entry road.

Following the meeting, a delightful and bountiful picnic supper was enjoyed by all. A secretly prepared "Swamp Slush" added to the evening's



merriment; winners of door prizes were pleased with gifts and "Cabin Fever" provided charming music throughout the evening.

imperative that we save these trees; to do otherwise would be a sacrilege.”

Meanwhile Judge Bristow, in the Senate since 1958, had concluded that the swamp was a “natural heritage which should be preserved for our children and their children.” With a love for the outdoors instilled by Harry Hampton, Bristow teamed with Rubin to stand up for the swamp.

For three days in April they filibustered with courage and conviction. Newspaper headlines indicate the flavor of the debate, with “Swamp Owners Oppose Preserve” and “Rubin Supports Swamp Preserve Saying ‘Nothing In This State

Compares’,” followed by “Gressette Questions Preserve” and “Poetic Bristow turns to Verse for Filibuster” or “Bristow waxed poetic today as he recited Kilmer’s ‘Trees’ on the Senate Floor”. At one point Bristow was also recorded as saying “I have a few more pearls to cast to you” and then more seriously he surmised “this resolution would let the fate of this forest of champions rest upon the bosoms of the foresters.”

After three days, Elder remembers Rubin and Bristow saying they’d done all they could; they didn’t have the votes to stop the resolution but they would salvage what they could. Desperate for a way to

change its meaning, they negotiated with Gressette and added one significant word, “intimidation,” to the resolution. The Senate finally went on record opposing acquisition through “condemnation or intimidation.” The resolution barely passed with a recorded vote of 15-12, and the compromise was hailed as a victory for the swamp forces.

A week later, at the first Congressional Hearing in Washington, Representative Roy Taylor made a point of noting for the record that the federal government never resorted to intimidation to acquire property. The Richland County delegation supported acquisition of the

swamp in a letter to the House Committee and Sen. Rubin and Rep. Bill Campbell personally testified at the Senate Committee hearing later that August.

Salvaging the situation in the Senate, standing up for preservation of the Congaree against great odds, Senators Bristow and Rubin deserve our respect, admiration, appreciation and honor. At a critical juncture in the campaign to save the swamp, they unselfishly stepped forward on their own initiative and did their part. Let their example guide us as we continue to protect this natural legacy with scenery as rare on this earth as any moonscape.”

Rembert Leads Flora Walk

On Sunday the 3rd of October the Annual Membership Meeting of Friends of Congaree Swamp was held. Several activities began at 4:00 pm including nature walks, bird walks, a canoe trip, and visits to the soon to be completed visitors/nature center.

At 4:00 I led the first group of members and their guests along the lower boardwalk into the swamp for observation and discussion of the plants.

The Congaree Swamp represents the last of the old growth bottomland, hardwood forest. Record size trees grow here. This environment supports a high canopy with the dominant trees being tupelo gum and baldcypress. In addition to these there are large black gums, sweet gums, several oak species, elms, hickories, and ash trees. In several parts of the swamp we also see large, record size loblolly pines.

This productive swamp is fed by the waters of the Congaree River. Often overflowing, the river deposits the rich nutrients and soils so vital to the life of the river swamp ecosystem.

In addition to the cathedral-like trees encountered on this perfect Sunday afternoon we observed several plants in the understory and forest floor habitats. The first plant in bloom that we observed was Hercules club (*Aralia spinosa*), a shrub or small tree with a very large panicle inflorescence. Close by were several wild sensitive plants (*Cassia nictitans*) in fruit. Several ferns were in abundance along the first part of the boardwalk including the southern lady fern (*Athyrium asplenoides*), the royal fern (*Osmunda regalis*), the cinnamon fern (*Osmunda cinnamomea*), the sensitive fern (*Onoclea sensibilis*), and the ebony spleenwort (*Asplenium platyneuron*). Some additional plants observed as we walked along the boardwalk, either in flower or fruit, were the American beauty bush (*Callicarpa americana*), false nettle (*Boehmeria cylindrica*), clearweed (*Pilea pumila*), climbing hempweed (*Mikania scandens*), waxweed (*Cuphea carthagensis*), marsh fleabane (*Pluchea foetida*), the cardinal flower (*Lobelia cardinalis*), jewel-weed or touch-me-not (*Impatiens capensis*), Walter's hypericum (*Hypericum walteri*), and one species of ladies tresses just beginning to bloom (*Spiranthes sp.*). We also saw the day flower (*Commelina virginica*), the switch cane (*Arundinaria gigantea*), an invasive grass (*Microstegium vimineum*), the duck-potato (*Sagittaria latifolia*), and a sedge (*Carex sp.*). Several vines were prominent as they climbed the many tree species in the swamp. These included the ever present poison ivy (*Rhus radicans*), supple jack (*Berchemia scandens*), the climbing hydrangea (*Decumaria barbara*), cross vine (*Bignonia capreolata*), Virginia creeper (*Parthenocissus quinquefolia*), and grape vines (*Vitis aestivalis*).

Our walk in the swamp was free of biting insects, and enhanced by the occasional butterfly, lizard, and bird; by drifting clouds, and a gentle breeze. We are truly blessed to have such a natural treasure here in the midlands of South Carolina.

Highlights of 1999

The second year of the FRIENDS group officially started in April of this year. We have had some solid accomplishments, along with 4 Board meetings during that time. Here are some highlights of those 6 months:

The newsletter has been upgraded, and placed on a regular schedule.

The Executive Committee has been quite active and has met regularly.

Our first membership renewal letters went out, and the returns have been good. Also, selected solicitation letters for new members have been sent out with good returns.

Our non-profit 501(c)(3) status is finally official and we have completed the Charitable Reporting paperwork for the Secretary of State.

Work has been done on a grant which will help the YWCA send disadvantaged youth to the Swamp, to see nature as they have never seen it before.

The Friends have met with staff of the new state children's museum to discuss an environmental component of the museum.

We have given input into regulatory matters which might affect the wellbeing of the Swamp.

Thanks to efforts of many people last year, Congress has this year approved \$1 million for land acquisition within the authorized Park boundaries.

The Friends contacted 2 individuals about purchasing land for inclusion within the Park. Norfolk Southern has been asked to donate a small parcel within the Park's eastern boundary. The company appears receptive. (The S.C. Rail Road Company purchased this parcel before the Civil War: an interesting complication to this situation is that public records proving ownership of the parcel burned in 1865 when Sherman came through Columbia.)

The Friends have written letters and made calls to the Congressional delegation in favor of increasing the Park's operating budget and staffing.

The Research Committee has done excellent work on projects within and outside the Park. John Grego has written 1 grant and proofed 2 others for the Park Service.

Discussions are underway concerning the 25th anniversary of Congaree Action Now, the overwhelmingly successful grassroots campaign which led to the saving of Congaree Swamp. It is hoped that this will be done in conjunction with the grand opening of the new Harry R.E. Hampton Visitors Center.

Thank You for being a member of the Friends, and for caring about this marvelous place we call Congaree. You are what make the difference. Please join us again for the year 2000!
